From the judge:

Of all the entrants, this one has the most of its own style that doesn't directly rely on other styles or internet memes; it is cute and clever and stands on its own. I appreciate that each panel has unique posing of the characters. My only note is that it seems like the artist used more panels than needed. The joke is basically driven by panel 3, 5, 6, and 8. Editing it down to just these would have allowed for different panel arrangements and sizing, opening up different ways to compose the setup and the payoff. I'd also recommend pushing yourself in the line weights of your characters, and to experiment with adding more depth to the color work with gradients, textures, and/or color combinations. References you may find handy:

- Understanding Comics by Scott McCloud: This is a really good breakdown of how comics work, and how to organize information and story. Has great insights on how time and space work with combinations of still images. He also has follow ups Making Comics and Reinventing Comics. His website ScottMccloud.com has some web comics on it as well that he did before web comics were really a thing. He also has videos on YouTube, some about the technical side about how he works in programs like Photoshop and Illustrator, some are recorded lectures.
- How to Draw Comics the Marvel Way by Stan Lee and Steve Buscema: Kind of old school and a bit hokey, but it has great information on how to have active compositions and make your work more exciting. Pretty much every comic artist I have heard interviewed cites this as an early influence on their work.
- Kirby: King of Comics by Mark Evanier: Part art book, part story about the life of Jack Kirby, probably the most influential artist in comics history. The Marvel characters he co-created (arguably having done more work on them than co-creator Stan Lee) have grossed billions of dollars. The book covers his life and has a great collection of work. He understood comics in a way no one else did. The art is kind of old school, but it is hard to beat how good and original he was. His story is also an interesting and tragic one.
- Any collected works of Calvin and Hobbes. To this day probably the best drawn/colored comic strip style comic. The writing and philosophy in the strips are also second to none.

background and the creative use of space. A couple things I would have changed:

The banners on the right-hand page. One has a line, the other doesn't. (Traditional Customs and Changing Traditions) Whatever you decide to do, be consistent. Either have them both with lines or both without. At the bottom under Changing Traditions...I would have made the A-B-C circles in the "Then" and "Now" smaller. At first glance I was confused as it appeared there was so much going on. I can tell the circles are a little smaller than the A-B-C at the bottom but not by much. I think this would

have been more visually pleasing if they were smaller.

From the judge: This October front page is nicely balanced with personalized stories about

the election occupying the important "above the fold" position. The election artwork is well done and the Losco quote provides context for the three stories about gun rights, immigration and education. The Harry Potter story anchors the bottom half of the page with News Briefs providing nice balance and contrast with spot color. Subheads in the "Potter" story would break up patterns of gray, however. From a content perspective, it might have been stronger to have interviewed students who actually could vote. The vignette about Rodriguez (immigration) and Gadient (gun rights) are effectively personal. Editors could have found a

strong point of entry and excellent narrative-driven stories.
